CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Deakin and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

ROLL CALL

Councilors present: Deakin, Gaba, Gardner, LeClerc, Macri, Pomerleau and Watson.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING (S)

Moved by Leclerc seconded Watson and voted to approve the minutes from the January 9, 2024 Town Council meeting minutes. (Unanimous)

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

The Clerk noted that there had been no petitions or communications received.

Councilor Pomerleau announced that the Bonny Eagle cross country team were recently presented with a state sentiment for winning the last nine of twelve state cross country championships, they were recognized by both the Maine House of Representatives and Senate.

Councilor Watson explained that the Standish Spectacular Parade will be brought back this year, noting that those who would like to participate should contact him.

Chair Deakin congratulated all the Bonny Eagle athletes for their efforts.

REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER

Tashia Pinkham reported on the following:

Scott Gesualdi- working on budget preparation.

Fire/Rescue- Staffing continues to be a concern, working on roof leak, and close to being done light upgrades through grant money.

HR/GA- A staff member will be out, and we are coordinating custodial care for the building.

PW- sharing about the importance of the new trucks and routes. A video regarding the matter is available on social media.

Rec- brought in new clothing donation boxes located at Mill Street Park, Johnson Field and the transfer station. As Councilor Watson mentioned the parade will be held on August 3rd.

Finance- Finished bond application, working on budget and a new fixed asset sheet.

Clerk- voting on the new PW trucks 3/5- building will be closed for business. New hire starting 2/20.

Code- Has been out sick, working through reports and permits.

Assessing- personal property inspections April 1.

Planning- Finished MPI/DOT grant, working on several others for fire fighters, and working with Scott Gesualdi reviewing what other towns charge for impact fees.

TM- Met with staff and reviewed upcoming mandatory training and dates. Ways to improve documentation/evals/time sheets/time off.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

**** Regarding the March 5, 2024 Special Town Meeting Referendum Vote - Municipal Referendum Question for Issuance of General Obligation Bonds and/or Bond Anticipation notes to include up to \$700,000 for the Purpose of Financing the Purchase of Four (4) Plow Trucks with Plow Gear and Related Equipment and Accessories for the Public Works Department****

Chair Deakin opened the public hearing, John Cross the Public Works Director explained that a bid process was recently held for the plowing of two of the town's contracted plowing routes. One of the previous plowing contractors disclosed that they did not want to continue their services. He explained that the returned bid results came in 119% higher than the previous plowing contracts. He said that they looked what would be the most cost-effective way for the town proceed, it was determined that to purchase the trucks and hire two full-time and two seasonal employees would be the most cost-effective solution for the town.

Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for council comments.

Councilor Pomerleau explained that this process was reviewed by the Capital Improvements Committee and was supported 100%. He said that it sounds like a lot of money but it will pay itself back in dividends down the road, this was great thinking outside of the box by John and his staff.

John Cross noted that a resident offered to produce an informational video at no cost that will air on social media.

Chair Deakin questioned if it was 50-miles of road involved?

John Cross explained that it was 50-miles of road but actually 100-miles of plowing.

Chair Deakin noted that it's an important function for the town to have. He also noted that the plow truck drivers would also be available for other Public Works-related duties.

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John Cross said that was correct.

Chair Deakin called for additional Council comments, hearing none, the hearing was closed.

10-24 Annual Recommendation to Adopt FY25 10-Year Capital Plan [Macri]

Chair Deakin opened the public hearing, Scott Gesualdi the Finance Director noted that the FY 25 Capital Plan is \$3,695,599 which includes plow trucks; and noted that the plan can be modified during the budget process.

Chair Deakin asked the sponsor of the item, Council Macri, if he had any comments.

Councilor Macri noted that he was not in attendance at the recent CIP meeting, he explained that this our 10-Year Capital Plan that is reviewed every year. He noted that the plan tracks the replacement of equipment.

Chair Deakin thanked the employees who take care of the town's resources do well. Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for additional council comments.

Councilor LeClerc noted for the people at home, this is the first step in the plan, it will be discussed further during the budget process.

Chair Deakin called for additional council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote and the public hearing was closed.

WHEREAS the Section 404 of the Standish Charter requires annual presentation, revision and adoption of a Capital Plan for the Town of Standish, now be it

RESOLVED, that the attached FY25 10-year Capital Plan is hereby adopted.

11-24 Application Submitted by Mili, Inc. dba Standish House of Pizza located at 35 Ossipee Trail West for renewal of a Malt Liquor (Beer) and Wine Restaurant License (Class I, II, III, IV) [Deakin]

Chair Deakin opened the public hearing and called for public comments, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote and then closed the hearing.

ORDERED that the application submitted by Mili, Inc. dba Standish House of Pizza located at 35 Ossipee Trail West for renewal Malt Liquor (Beer) and Wine Restaurant License (Class I, II, III, IV) is approved by Council, to expire as determined by the Department of Public Safety.

VOTE: 7 Yeas

Chair Deakin called for the Consent Calendar items.

Councilor LeClerc called for a point of order, noting that Committee Reports was the next agenda item.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councilor Pomerleau – Ad-hoc Cemetery Committee – No Report.

Councilor LeClerc – Appointments Committee – Met today regarding an order on the agenda tonight for an appointment to the Saco River Corridor Committee. In addition, the committee discussed the Comprehensive Plan Committee noting that approximately 20 applications were received, thirteen individuals will be interviewed.

Councilor Watson – Finance Committee – Met yesterday and reviewed the upcoming budget process.

Councilor Deakin – Ordinance Committee - Were unable to meet, noting that the Flood Plain Ordinance is on the agenda for consideration.

Councilor Gaba – Economic Development Committee – Did not meet.

Councilor Macri – Capital Improvements Committee – An item regarding the Route 114/35 intersection is on the agenda tonight.

Councilor Gardner – Personnel Committee – No Report.

Chair Deakin called for additional comments regarding committee reports.

Anthony Folsom, resident - questioned when does the Recycling Committee meet?

John Cross noted that the Recycling Committee's most recent meeting was in November 2023 where they selected the recycling artwork that has been published in the Shopping Guide. Mr. Cross noted their meetings are published on the website.

Chair Deakin noted that the Recycling Committee meets on an as needed basis.

Maurie Hill, resident – asked for an update on the ordinance regarding people hauling trash for others.

Tashia Pinkham explained that they are working on the ordinance with legal counsel.

John Cross noted that Scott Hastings anticipated that the document should be before the Council in April.

14-24 Authorize Girl Scout Troop 2403 to Sell Cookies at the Transfer Station [Deakin]

WHEREAS, Girl Scout Troop 2403 is a non-profit organization whose fundraising efforts serve the members of the troop, and

WHEREAS, Girl Scout Troop 2403 desires to sell cookies at the Transfer Station as a fundraiser for their organization, now be it

ORDERED, that the Standish Town Council authorizes Girl Scout Troop 2403 to sell cookies at the Transfer Station on April, 7, 2024, and

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Director of Public Works will direct the Girl Scout Troop 2403 where they can set up at the Transfer Station.

15-24 Waive No Parking Restriction on Saco Road for the Bonny Eagle Car Show [Deakin]

ORDERED that the 'no parking' restriction on the north and south sides of Saco Road between the Standish town line and Cape Road (Route 35 A), shall be waived for a period two hours before the opening of the Bonny Eagle Car Show held by the Athletic Boosters until two hours after the close of the show to be held on May 19, 2024 at the Bonny Eagle High School, and

FURTHER ORDERED that the coordinators of the event shall provide traffic control beginning one hour before and during the hours of the show.

Councilor LeClerc noted that all these groups do excellent work in this community.

Chair Deakin called for additional Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote.

Chair Deakin again called for public comments on the repeal of Chapter 4, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote to move this to public hearing at the March Council meeting.

Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote.

WHEREAS the Council *Rules of Procedure* allow for the date of the meeting to be changed upon vote of the Council, and

WHEREAS the Charter requires that the Public Hearing on the Town's budget is held at the first Council meeting in March and holding the regular meeting earlier in the month provides a longer timeline for the budget process, now be it

ORDERED that the regular meeting of the Standish Town Council be changed to Wednesday, March 6, 2024 to be held at Council Chambers at the Standish Municipal Center beginning at 6:00 p.m.

17-24 Call for a Public Hearing for the FY 25 Municipal Budget to be held at the March 6, 2024 Town Council Meeting [Deakin]

Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote.

ORDERED that the Town Council calls that a Public Hearing will be held on Wednesday, March 6, 2024 at the Standish Municipal Center, 175 Northeast Road, Standish, Maine during the regularly scheduled meeting of the

Standish Town Council which starts at 6:00 pm, for the purpose of soliciting discussion of the FY 25 budget as received by the Council, as required by the Charter.

18-24 Approve Amended Warrant for the March 5, 2024 Special Town Meeting Referendum Vote [Deakin]

Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote.

WHEREAS, Order #2-24 approved the warrant for the Special Town and Meeting Referendum Vote to be held on Tuesday, March 5, 2024, and

WHEREAS, it has been discovered that the closing time of the polls was omitted from the warrant, and

WHEREAS, the warrant has been posted for more than seven days, now be it

ORDERED that Town Council approves the Amended Special Town Meeting Referendum Vote Warrant and directs the resident who posted the original warrant to remove the original warrant and any attached postings and replace it with the attached Amended Special Town Meeting Referendum Vote Warrant and related materials.

19-24 Amendments to the Standish Town Code, Chapter 146, Floodplain Management (Introduction)[Deakin]

Moved by LeClerc seconded by Watson to dispense with the reading of the ordinance. (Unanimous)

Zachary Mosher the Town Planner noted that this ordinance update is required by the State. He noted that it is important that Standish updates this ordinance so that residents will be eligible for flood insurance. He noted that he received an email today that explained that the words "as amended" were omitted from the draft that was sent to us. He asked for their consideration under 146-1. to add the words "as amended" as shown in the excerpt from their email shown below:

The areas of special flood hazard, Zones A, AE, AO, AH, and VE for the (Town/City) of _____, Cumberland County, Maine, identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in a report entitled "Flood Insurance Study – Cumberland County, Maine" dated June 20, 2024, with accompanying "Flood Insurance Rate Map" dated June 20, 2024, as amended, are hereby adopted by reference and declared to be a part of this Ordinance.

Moved by Leclerc seconded by Gaba to amend the Flood Plaine Management Ordinance by adding the words "as amended" as recommended by the Town Planner. (Unanimous)

20-24 Award Bid for Intersection Layout and Signalization of the Route 114 & 35 Intersection[Macri]

Zach Mosher noted that the is finally happening. He noted that Shaw Brothers was the selected contractor.

Anthony Folsom mentioned that he was unable to find the plans on the town's website.

Tashia Pinkham said that plan has not changed, it is the same plan that was presented at the most recent meeting regarding the construction project. There were only minor changes in regards to crosswalks.

Heidi Watson, resident – questioned when will the construction begin?

Tashia Pinkham noted that the construction timeline will be published on various platforms including social media.

Councilor Macri announced that the Shaw Brothers bid was the low bid by approximately \$40,000. He noted that we will receive approximately \$625,000 in grant funds.

Chair Deakin asked about traffic control during the project?

Tashia Pinkham explained that there will be flaggers directing traffic.

Councilor Macri noted that much of the construction will be done, however there may be delays in obtaining some of the needed materials, he asked that the public be patient.

Chair Deakin called for public comments, hearing none, he called for Council comments, hearing none, he called for the roll call vote.

WHEREAS as a bid process has been conducted for layout and signalization of the intersection of Routes 114 and 35, in accordance with section 302 (f) of the Standish Charter, and

ORDERED that the attached Recommendation of Award from Gorrill Palmer to award Shaw Brothers of Maine as described in the bid specifications in the amount of \$1,618,012.60 is hereby accepted for this construction project, and

FURTHER ORDERED that the Town Manager is authorized on behalf of the Town to execute related contract documents.

PUBLIC ITEMS

Heidi Watson, fundraiser for the Summer Spectacular announced the sponsor levels available to support the Standish Summer Spectacular. She noted that the parade will be returning this year.

Chair Deakin questioned the route of the parade?

Heidi Watson noted that they have not finalized the start and end of the parade, but the parade will travel on Route 25.

Councilor Gaba asked if there was a way to donate to the Summer Spectacular online?

Heidi Watson said that an online donation platform is being developed.

Anthony Folsom said that he was glad to see the signage at the car charging station. He said that he has done research and there are grants available for charging stations.

Tashia Pinkham said that the grants that are available from Efficiency Maine are if you are installing 12 stations. She said that we want one station and the cost is approximately \$12,000.

Anthony Folsom said that he knew if it's 220 amps is very expensive. He thought that the state and federal grants are available. He went on to say if you search charging stations in Standish this location is the one that pops up.

Anthony Folsom then noted that he's observed many using the transfer station without stickers on their vehicle. He then questioned if the Councilors paid for their transfer station sticker?

It was noted that the Councilors pay for their Transfer Station stickers.

John Cross noted that residents can use the recycling bins without purchasing a Transfer Station a sticker.

Anthony Folsom said that he has seen people dumping trash without a sticker.

Maurie Hill questioned if you can only use the signage if you're here for town business?

Tashia Pinkham said that the town wants to discourage overnight parking here.

Isabel Higgins put a plea out for membership on the MSAD No. Budget Advisory Committee. She highlighted the budget process, the need for more members and the district's needs.

Todd Delaney, a member and founder of the BAC noted that applications for this committee are on the MSAD No. 6 website and there are several slots available for municipal candidates.
